About Killings by Police

Number of people in the U.S. killed by police this year (through September 29, 2015)

45

Number of police charged or indicted from 2005-2015, during which time police killed thousands of people, (only 11 police have been convicted of any crime for these deaths).

33

Number of police killed by people this year (through September 29, 2015)

 Black people are two-and-a-half times as likely to be killed by police than are white people.

A Nation of Mass Incarceration

2.3 MIL

There are approximately 2.3 million people in U.S. prisons and jails. The U.S. has the largest prison population in the world.

40%

Black people make up almost 40 percent of the total prison and jail population, but are only about 13 percent of the U.S. population. African-Americans, Latinos, and American Indians have the highest rates of incarceration.

25%

The United States has 5 percent of the world's population and 25 percent of its prisoners.

In 2015, there are more than 201,000 women prisoners in the U.S., about 8.8 percent of the total American prison and jail population, and the U.S. female prison/jail population is growing.

33%

Nearly a third of all female prisoners worldwide are incarcerated in the U.S.

800%

African-American women's incarceration rate has increased by 800 percent since 1986, compared with an increase of 400 percent for women of other races and nationalities

Genocide

- The maternal mortality rate for some Black women is 12 times as high as white women.
- Life expectancy for Black people is dramatically lower than that of white people—as much as three decades less than whites in some areas of the U.S.
