


Stolen Lives – Killed by police:



Oscar Grant, 22 years old.
Killed by BART police in Oakland, January 1, 2009.
On his way home from celebrating New Year's Eve, Grant was punched and shoved to the ground by cops. As he lay face down on the train platform, a cop shot him in the back.




Alberta Spruill, 57 years old.
Killed by NYPD, May 16, 2003.
Police with guns drawn rammed down the door and threw in a stun grenade. After the police forced Alberta Spruill down on the ground and handcuffed her, she had a heart attack and died. Later police said they hit the wrong apartment.




Malcolm Ferguson, 23 years old.
Killed by NYPD, March 1, 2000.
Shot by police in the back of the head while laying face down on a stairwell. The murder took place just a few blocks from where Amadou Diallo was killed in a barrage of 41 police bullets, just a week after the cops who killed Diallo were exonerated.



Meliton Recendez, 15 years old.
Killed by Chicago police, September 28, 2007.
Shot by the police as he was coming home from the store. His mother went outside when she heard shots in her backyard – the police would not let her see what was happening.



Brownie Polk, 46 years old.
Killed by Oakland police, August 1, 2009.
Shot multiple times by a cop who claimed Polk threatened her with a hatchet. The owner and clerks at the store where Polk was killed dispute the police story. Brownie Polk was the second Black man shot to death by Oakland cops in less than a month.



Sean Bell, 23 years old.
Killed by NYPD, November 25, 2006.
Police fired more than 50 shots into the car Sean Bell was sitting in, killing him and seriously injuring two others. Sean Bell had been out celebrating the night before his wedding. The cops who shot him were acquitted of any crime.
